### HCE Member - Dorothy Singley Walker Extraordinaire

Think you're too old to be a regular walker? Meet Dorothy Singley, 90 plus years old, an HCE member AND a faithful walker who has recorded on the average an hour a day for the past year. Almost every day she walks 30 to 105 minutes.

Congratulations to her for her faithfulness to this program! She stated that it is a good time to visit and meet friends along the way. She's had to "slow down" when, after knee surgery, her doctor limited her to walking no more than 20 minutes at a time. She's modified to walking several times during the day.

Dorothy was raised on a farm around Springfield at Auburn, IL. She came to Bloomington to work at State Farm and met her husband, Lloyd, and became a farmer's wife. They farmed five miles northwest of Normal on what today is known as Ropp Road.

Married in February, 1946, Dorothy was approached by neighboring women about joining Home Bureau, now known as Home and Community Education. She joined Dry Grove Unit because it was an all-rural group. Dues were \$1. Their meetings were held in members' homes. At one time, Dry Grove Unit had up to 50 members. When Dorothy hosted the group, they moved furniture out of the living room and her husband would go to the one room country school, Garfield School and get 50 chairs for the meeting. She spoke of some of the lessons being on canning, cooking and cleaning, all things a new bride needed to learn. Home Bureau and the Dry Grove Unit gave Dorothy a way to meet people and get acquainted from her involvement with Farm Bureau Committees.

She worked at the 4-H Fair as Committee Chairman for the Home Economics Projects. Dorothy was a member of the County 4-H Board when Margaret Esposito was hired as Home Adviser. She remembers donating food and working at the "Cook House" at the county fair which was manned by volunteers from the county units. They served 3 meals a day to the hungry 4-H kids and anyone else that was hungry.

Dorothy remembers that the Dry Grove Unit served lunches for farm sales including Lloyd and Dorothy's dairy farm sale. Dry Grove also took turns with other units in providing meals for functions at the Farm Bureau Building at the East Locust St., location in Bloomington. She recalls her husband cutting out step stools and women putting them together and staining them for a large sale held at the Consistory as part of a fund raiser. She still has one of the stools in her apartment.

Dorothy and Lloyd moved off the farm in April, 2007 after he had some health problems. She still lives in the apartment in Normal and has lots of area to walk. Dorothy is an inspiration to us all!
