

Payments made after that deadline are payable at the new \$5.00 per member rate and must be postmarked by January 15, 2014. A late fee of \$15.00 is accessed if the postmark date is after the January 15th date.

You must pay your dues in a timely manner to be eligible to have voting delegates for your county at the Annual Conference.

I am sure over the years I have disappointed some of the membership but I feel I did the best job I could. I always try to give at least 110% when I attempt an assignment. District Workshops are a great way to meet the other members of our great organization! It was so nice to see so many there and really listening to the




information that the IAHCE officers had for you to utilize when you return back to your counties. Don't forget to go over that information, the ladies really take a lot of time assembling those packets for you.

The ACWW Triennial Conference was held in Chennai, India. Chennai is a port city on the southeast coast of India. A very busy city and also known as the silk capital. The population was 17,000,000 people with about 5,000,000 vehicles. The cars were the small size cars but there were many motor bikes weaving in and out of the cars and buses. I closed my eyes many times as I did not think we could squeeze through the traffic without colliding with a bike or car. I felt we were close enough to perhaps shake hands with the people on the other bus at times. They were unable to travel at a high speed because of the number of vehicles but everyone seemed to be ok with that and

waited for the traffic to move. There were also many people walking along the side of the road.

We were taken by bus from our various hotels to the Convention Center each day. It was very exciting to see the city come alive each day. It was exciting to be your representative at the conference. I saw and met many women from all parts of our world. Everyday during the business meeting, we heard of presentations to help improve the lives of young girls and women in such need of help to make their lives safer and healthier. Many resolutions were passed to be taken to the United Nations by the ACWW representative to encourage other nations to also work to improve the life of young girls and women.

The conference was 8 days long. After conference, I traveled with several others for a 5 day bus tour of different parts of India. We left Chennai and traveled to the cities of Delhi, Agra and Jaipur. We saw many amazing sights, met many people and tried many dishes.

I have a lot of pictures to show you and much to tell you about their culture and country. I look forward to sharing this with you during 2014.
