



The "Fun Walk" at the beginning of IAHCE's March 2015 Annual Conference was a first time success.

The current IAHCE yearly theme "Come Together-Walk With IAHCE" and the ACWW "Women Walk the World" annual awareness program made a great fit for creating an inside walking track at the Decatur Conference Center, site of the Annual Conference.

Registering for the walk were 59 IAHCE members and one other Conference Center guest, a man interested in what IAHCE was all about. Even people that didn't register walked the course. At the 6 continent stops along the course, walkers received a flag stamp on their "Fun Walk Card" of a country that has ACWW members.

Thank you to the nine IAHCE members that staffed the continental stops and to the walk registrar. Some staffers dressed to showcase their focus country: USA, Chile, Ireland, Mongolia, South Africa, Figi.

Ten counties did a Women Walk the World event in 2014. After the enthusiasm surrounding the Fun Walk, I hope even more counties were inspired to do a Women Walk the World event this year. *April 29 is Women Walk the World Day*; but walks can be scheduled on other days if desired. The deadline for submitting pictures and articles to ACWW for the Best Photo Contest plus possible inclusion in their CountryWoman magazine is May 15.

Congratulations to the Winners of International Education Awards. Thank you to all the International directors who sent me 30 award submissions. Creativity abounded. \$1,000 in mini-stipends was shared by 21 counties to help with their International activity expenses. And, a special thanks to all IAHCE counties for your efforts that led to collection of \$14,421.44 for Pennies for Friendship in year 2014.

At the International Share Shop held during the IAHCE Annual Conference, attendees viewed a PowerPoint presentation about he Associated Country Women of the World, ACWW, including an explanation of the lifecycle of Projects they fund through the generous donation of members like yourself. Mildred Lamprect, Tazewell County International Director, provided two German made door prizes for the Share Shop.

A search in Estonia, Ireland and Nova Scotia is under way to select one woman to come to Illinois in March 2016 as a participant in the IAHCE International Homemaker Exchange. We need hosts in Illinois for this expected visitor. Please send a completed Host Application (page 41 of the IAHCE Guidebook) to Pat Weitzmann, International Director by July 1, 2015.

As of March 31, 2015, IAHCE has adopted a new ACWW project. It's Project Number is 0981, "Cultivation Skills and Education/School Support for Children, Women and Families". You'll hear more about it in future newsletters. The Project takes place in Sri Lanka, an island country of 20 million people Southeast of India, previously known as Ceylon.

I am honored to be re-elected to the position of IAHCE International Director for 2015-2018. My enthusiasm for connecting with the members of IAHCE and for furthering the education and good works of IAHCE members continues.

With the newness of spring, I am pleased to introduce myself as your new IAHCE Extension Liaison.







Here's a recipe to enjoy (from a Taste of Home insert):

Apple Dumplings

Sauce: Dough: 2 cups granulated sugar 2 cups flour

2 cups water 2 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 cup butter or margarine 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon salt 2/3 cup shortening 2/3 cup milk

Filling: 1/4 c. sugar, 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon, 3 c. shredded, peeled cooking apples (3 or 4): Golden Delicious, Rome, Granny Smith, Jonathon, or Newton Pippins.

<u>Directions for Sauce:</u> In large saucepan combine sauce ingredients. Bring to boil. Boil 5 minutes; set aside. Makes about 2 cups sauce.

<u>Directions for Dough:</u> In large mixing bowl, combine dough dry ingredients. With pasty blender, cut in shortening until pea-size. Make well in center. Add milk all at once. Stir just 'til moistened. Knead dough on lightly floured surface 10-12 strokes until nearly smooth. Roll out to 12" x 10" rectangle..

<u>Directions for Filling</u>: Combine the 1/4 c. sugar and 1/2 tsp. cinnamon; set aside. Sprinkle applies evenly over dough. Sprinkle with sugar mixture. Roll dough into spiral, starting on a long side. Pinch seam to seal. Cut into 12 1" thick pieces. Place in a 13" x 9" x 2" baking pan. Pour sauce over dumplings. Bake at 350 degrees or until golden. Cool in pan.




