Exciting things are happening within IAHCE for the International education program.

At the June 2015 Board meeting \$1,400 in donations given to youth oriented organizations:

\$500 for IFYE - 3 youths traveling to Finland: Kyan Probst (Monroe County), Abigail Baird Winnebago County), Kali Vlastos (St. Clair County)

\$500 for LABO inbound program - 50 Japanese youth in Illinois mid July – mid August
\$400 for Illinois 4H Foundation

The Homemaker Exchange project moved to the next phase. Our offer of exchange has been accepted. I am working with two women from the Village Development Society Saaniku in Estonia to bring them to Illinois in March 2016. It's not too early to volunteer to be an HCE host family for them. Just contact me with your interest and any questions.

The ACWW project 0981 in Sri Lanka that IAHCE adopted in March is going well. The project provides Cultivation Skills and Education/School Support for Children, Women and Families. We pledged £2,140 within a year. (That's about \$3,214.) See a separate article in this newsletter for more information and pictures. So, when you are donating for Pennies for Friendship, consider giving something extra towards the Sri Lanka project.

Whether your county did an ACWW 'Women Walk the World' activity this Spring or are doing one in the Summer, thank you for walking for your health and raising awareness of women's needs. University of Illinois Extension will be offering an update "Yes! You Can: Preserving Safely" home canning lesson. For anyone needing it, we will be testing pressure canner lids/gauges in the class or at your local Extension office. Some offices will be offering the additional freezing and drying lessons in this series. Just more ways to preserve your foods!

As well, we will be offering a variety of programs on brain health, including "FIT WITS" and "Head Strong." While keeping our bodies healthy is important, don't forget about maintaining a healthy, active brain. Water Around the World NVON Project in Common 2013-2015

The NVON "water filter" project in common will be drawing to a close as of December 31, 2015. The objective of the three-year international project was to present an overview of how water is an essential resource and fundamental building block of life, present an awareness of problems that could arise when clean water is lacking in communities, and how we can help those in need around the world. The eight member states of the NVON were encouraged to participate by raising funds to purchase filters. The states responded by collecting \$10,867.90 in 2013, \$40,375.07 in 2014, and as of June 30, 2015, \$15,490.19 has been collected. A check for \$4,214.34 was presented at the NVON Conference held in Martinsburg, West Virginia on July 14 thru 16, by IAHCE president, Jane Chapman and the other delegates from Illinois, bringing the total raised in Illinois for the water filter project to \$11,093.52! Great work "Team IAHCE"!

The different areas of the world that have benefited from the filter project are; Malawi, Thailand, South Sudan, Liberia, Sierra Leone, Maratane Refugee Camp in Mozambique and most recently Kathmandu, Nepal. The filters sent to Nepal were distributed to schools, orphanages, and villages in the aftermath of the earthquake.

The filter project officially ends as the Project in Common at the end of the year. Due to the popularity of the project, the continued demand for filters throughout the world, and the public awareness that NVON is receiving the filters project will continue as a special activity project. More info to come on the new Project in Common for 2016 thru 2018 entitled "Eat Local, Eat Healthy".

A little side note...We don't always know the power of the website...A third grade teacher at Barry Elementary School in Cortland, NY stumbled upon the NVON website and requested information on the water filter project. Her class educated themselves on the importance of clean water and the fact that all children do not have that luxury. They organized a plastic bottle collection, bake sales, and encouraged their PTA for fundraising efforts. They contributed \$1080 toward our project to purchase filters.

April 29, 2015 was a beautiful day that added to the enthusiasm of 20 **DE KALB COUNTY** folks as they walked to raise money to fund a Ceramic Water Filter factory followed by fellowship of soup and bread while listening to speakers Kurt Thurmaier and Mary Okeyo talk about the water project.

The factory will be owned and operated by women potters in Tanzania. The SAFE Water Now filter tests at 99.9% microbiological effectiveness. The women will have income for their families and their community will have access to safe water. \$5,000 collected previously by the Homemakers has funded the factory which is being built with cooperation of Tanzania Development Support and Northern Illinois University. Two University graduate students are going to Musoma this summer to advise the women on the business side of their project.

The annual walks will help defray expenses to keep the factory going. A portion of our Women Walk the World proceeds each year is being sent to ACWW.

INTERNATIONAL NEWS and NOTES

ADOPTED PROJECT IN SRI LANKA

Earlier this year IAHCE was fortunate enough to come off the waiting list and adopt a project through our affiliate, The Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW). It officially has the title "PROJECT NO: 0981 Cultivation Skills and Education/School Support for Children, Women and Families".



Sri Lanka, known previously as Ceylon, is an island country in the Indian Ocean south of India. It is slightly larger than West Virginia. Sri Lanka has a population of 20.48 million, while West Virginia has a 1.85 million population.



This project is sponsored and managed by NEST a member society of ACWW just like IAHCE. It has 173 members (100 of them women). 'NEST began in 1984 and works with vulnerable people in many areas of Sri Lanka, focusing particularly on issues such as mental health and abuse. The organization's Community Health Workers carry out home visits, accompany sick people to hospital, offer counselling and provide many other types of support to those in need'. Our Adopted Sri Lanka Project is the fourth one year project from Nest that ACWW has funded since 2010. They have a great success record, so their very ambitious goal expecting to help around 150,000 women, 30,000 men and 75,000 children is doable.

'NEST plans to train families and communities in cultivating their home gardens to produce a better harvest of vegetables and fruit. The beneficiaries can then use the produce themselves to improve their diets, and sell the surplus at local markets (Polas). NEST will also provide support for school children, such as helping with bus fares and providing school uniforms and essential school equipment, to encourage regular attendance. Often children without a proper uniform abscond from school because they are ashamed, thus damaging their education. Various types of skill training will be offered to women and to children (through linkages with local government schools). The Community Health Workers will also encourage the beneficiaries to put some of their income into a Savings Bank account. It is hoped that as a result of this project, the beneficiaries will have more of a sense of purpose in life, have more income and, for the children, be in a better position to benefit from the educational opportunities which they have.'

Near the end of 2015, we expect a progress report on 'Our Adopted Sri Lanka project'. It began in March and is going well per ACWW. See pictures included with this article.
