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

By now you have probably found the mistyped words in the instructional materials. The real words that spell-check ignored and I didn't catch while proofreading have been corrected.

Please note that the new e-mail address of our IAHCE Second Vice President, Margaret Duncan, is ${\rm mad}\,1236@{\rm verizon.net}$

In the past when I worked with major mailings, they have either been a flat rate or bulk rate. When I mailed the IAHCE June Board Meeting Minutes, which would not fit neatly into a business size envelope and needed to be weighed, I learned that a maximum of ten items were allowed per transaction. Because the post office was not busy at the time, the postal clerk processed all seventeen 9" X 12" envelopes at one time.

That prepared me for the Pre-Annual Conference Packet that I will be mailing for our IAHCE President to all the Illinois HCE County organizations. I took a 9" X 12" envelope, the first class postage rate sheets from the internet, and a document with number pages printed on 20 weight paper to the post office to estimate the weight of the mailing. The postal clerk weighed the envelope after each group of pages were added. The results were 88¢ for the envelope and three pages, with 17¢ more for up to five additional pages. This information is now listed on the internet rate sheets. Having been warned that extra pages

may be added to the packet, I left the post office with enough postage for an eighteen sheet mailing. When I send the packets, it will be necessary to verify the weight with only one envelope.

If you have sent me your current address list of county officers, your County President will be receiving that Pre-Annual Conference Packet.

Currently, the IAHCE Community Outreach Project is to collect articles for the soldiers.






Did you ever experience such a cold and wet summer!! Seems like we were mowing lawns and weeding constantly.

Fun Day found members arriving with items for food pantries in Moultrie-Douglas counties. Again this year the needs increase and I was pleased with the variety.



MACON.....

Quilts, recycling of electronics and hats made with recycled items were on the program for the Macon County HCE Fall Meeting. Activities of the day included a display of items made from recycled materials and one promoting plans to make and fill large stockings (made from fabric scraps) to be delivered to the Danville Veterans Hospital.

Wanda Stickles, a volunteer with Rock Springs
Center, showed examples of the quilt blocks that
were made to aid slaves traveling north by
showing which houses could provide food, a place
to sleep or transportation on the journey.
Sometimes called the "Underground Railroad" quilt,
her sample was a modern version, but used the
same techniques and fabric scraps that might have

been used in the pre-Civil War time. Other quilts shown included historic buildings of Decatur and an embroidered quilt featuring butterflies.

Quilters were among the first "recyclers", using curtains, clothing, feed bags and any materials available to make quilts to keep the family warm. The idea of valuing quilts for artistic reasons came much later.

Don Sharp, recycling coordinator for BLH Computers, Inc. told of the need to keep electronic devices out of the landfills. Presently, Macon County and, soon throughout Illinois, landfill operators will not accept electronic items. BLH Computers, with centers in Springfield and at 2350 EE Logan St., Decatur, will accept computers, televisions (except those with wood cases), cell phones, radios and desk phones. The company breaks down each item to its basic parts, before sending components to other firms that do further work until every part of the item has been reduced to parts that can be used again. Recycling electronics keeps undesirable chemicals from going back into the soil and possibly leaching out into water supplies.

Hats made by several members were modeled. A hat by Carol Dilbeck was voted most popular. She was given a one-year membership in HCE.



Another food was sweet cream sweet potatoes, which, she stated, "was like a cranberry sauce consistency and was very sweet and very good." She shared they grill their foods, both meat and vegetables, a lot.

Borries shared much information concerning

Argentina and showed many slides showing all of the features of the country. All in all, it was a very pleasant and informational evening.
