### SECRETARY CAROLYN FISHER


## NEWSLETTER ON THE WEBSITE!

## PRESIDENT DONATES QUILT FOR OVARIAN CANCER

Last March at the annual conference, Lynn Kearney, Family Issues Director, announced the focus for Family Issues during 2010 would be to learn about Ovarian Cancer. This topic was something I was very interested in because my youngest daughter had just had her third bout with ovarian cancer. The East Central Illinois Shop Hop was also supporting ovarian cancer research along with the Blank Quilting Fabric Company. I, of course, was very interested in doing my part to raise money to assist in the research to help my daughter and many other women who have this Silent Killer. So I began right away on this quilt which uses teal fabric, the color used to denote ovarian cancer. I finished the blocks in a short time. ## GUIDELINES FOR FAMILY ISSUES PROJECT TAB COLLECTION DONATION

The collection of aluminum tab collection project will be a statewide activity to help charitable organizations. The aluminum tabs will be donated to organizations, such as the Ronald McDonald House, who in turn recycles the tabs and uses the money to help keep their facilities available to families who need assistance.

- 1. Each county in Illinois is allowed to participate in the project.
- 2. For this project, only the aluminum tabs (not the entire can) should be collected.
- 3. The aluminum tabs should be weighed and certified by a written weigh scale ticket. The scale ticket should include the following information: name of business where scales were used, signature of employee completing the scale ticket, official weight printed on the scale ticket.
- 4. Deliver the aluminum tabs to any local, charitable organization (such as a Ronald McDonald home or other organization). Pictures should be taken when the tabs are delivered, and a brief story written that explains how the tabs will help the organization or families who are assisted by the organization.
- The report of each county's activity for this project must be mailed by the postmarked date of January 31. Items in the report should include:
  - Scale tickets with name of business, signature, and weight information
  - Pictures that depict the delivery of the tabs and the story that describes how the tabs will help the organization or families associated with the organization. (refer to Guideline #4)
  - Short written statement that describes what your county has learned from this project.
  - The report will be on display at the State Conference.

 The county with the largest amount of tabs collected and delivered will be recognized at the State Conference in March. A county wide trophy will be presented.

# Final reports should be mailed to the Family Issues Director, Norma Korte.

(No money should be turned in to any HCE representative. If the county chooses to recycle cans also, then please give the money to a charitable organization of your choice or use it for your county funds.)
