



I included in the Family Issues packets from the District Workshops some instructions for







CWC Conference

I attended the CWC, Country Women's Council, Conference in Manchester, New Hampshire in September. There was plenty of opportunity for sharing,

networking and information gathering/ generation. The New Hampshire Circle of Home and Family members were impressive hostesses. CWC President Marian Brown kept us informed about "CWC Who, What, When and Where".

Since this was also the USA Area Meeting of ACWW, Associated Country Women of the World, USA Area President Beverly Earnhart showed us how we are all connected from the county level up to the world level with her "How Does ACWW

Resemble Pieces of Broken China?" presentation. Jo Ellen Almond, ACWW Secretary, was in attendance. She talked about the 2013 ACWW Triennial Conference in Chennai, India that she is chairing and her candidacy for the ACWW Presidency. Jo Ellen is an Indiana resident and a well qualified candidate for the presidential position. There hasn't been a USA President of ACWW since Ruth B. Sayre over 65 years ago.

I encourage each county International Director to at least once a year share with county members information about ACWW and its current activities. By the March 2013 IAHCE Annual Meeting, I hope to hear that every county has at least one person or the County Board holding membership with ACWW.

The CWC Board encouraged more member societies to submit applications made by their state residents for the Ruth B. Sayre Scholarship for women's higher education. There were four \$500 scholarships given in 2012 to three young women from lowa and one from Wisconsin. Both traditional and home schooled students are eligible for the scholarships.

At the NVON, National Volunteer
Outreach Network, meeting held
during the CWC conference there
was a micron fiber water filter demonstration by Pat
Breznay, V.P. of NVON. The \$60 small filter makes
1 million gallons of clean, safe water out of dirty
water. Pat is Chairperson of NVON's Water Around
the World project in common that starts in 2013.
NVON is encouraging the donation and
dissemination of water filters to families who do not
have access to clean water. Check out

HCE Members at AWIU Delegation

Joan McEachern, Kendall County, traveled with a delegation of women to the Balkans, with the American Women for International Understanding, (AWIU.org) earlier in the summer. Their stay lasted three weeks.

They met with many women's organizations in Serbia, Bosnia, Herzegovina, Hungary, Croatia, Montenegro and Slovenia. One meeting was with the American Ambassadors in Belgrade, Sarajevo and Budapest. Another with the International Trust Fund.

the first Roma member of the Hungarian Parliament. She was also one of eight women honored in 2011 by the US State Department as an International Woman of Courage. One of her main concerns is improving the education for Roma children.




