## **EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORTS**

### **COMMUNITY OUTREACH**

#### From - Carolyn Fisher

First, let us clean up some unfinished business. Nancy Remmers wants me to remind you



about the NVON / IAHCE projects which have been completed. We are no longer collecting nurses uniforms, embroidery floss, seam binding or items for the Tarahumari Indians of Mexico. Our current **2007 NVON Project** in common is a revised form of "Stitches for Survival". Please refer to the NVON (National Volunteer Outreach Network) website (www.nvon.org) under "projects" for the complete information and instructions. This time they are very specific about what they need to be sent.

The second item is current unfinished business. In the Community Outreach 2006 IAHCE District Workshops, sources for wool yarn were questioned. My article with sources was not printed in the previous newsletter. However, since then changes in some sources have occurred. I have found "Lion Brand Wool Ease" in the following chains: Hancock Fabrics, JoAnne Fabrics (New York Fabrics, Cloth World) and Walmart. Since then it has been rumored that Walmart will be eliminating its fabric and craft section. I have yet to receive an answer from them as to whether or not this is true. The best mail order source is Herrschners. 2800 Hoover Avenue, Stevens Point, WI 54492. Their retail store is a fun place to visit. Besides having their basic mail order catalogue, they also have a yarn catalogue. Their telephone number is 715-341-8686, e-mail address is: http://www.herrschners.com.

Currently, the IAHCE Community Outreach project is to collect school supplies for a school in your area. Other successful outreach projects from your county in 2007 may qualify you for a President's Award!

On the environmental front, mercury is again a rising concern. Those new high density energy saving light bulbs are now rumored to contain mercury (which means they cannot go into the landfill). Mercury is also a component of Thimerosal. Thimerosal is commonly used in some contact lens solutions and flu shots. Keep

## MEMORIALS

Eunice Pagel - Past State President 1917 - 2007



### Martha Eunice Pagel, 89, of Rockford,

died on Thursday, February 1, 2007 at the Springwood Nursing Home in Rockford. She was born April 14, 1917 to Eleanor and Neil Gale of Burritt Township. She graduated from Rockford High School in 1934. She married Charles E. Pagel, lived and worked in Rockford for years, then moved back to Burritt Township to farm and raise their adopted infant son. Eunice was a 4-H club leader for 25 years and helped young ladies with countless prom and bridesmaid's dresses.

She taught sewing lessons at the Champion Park Apts. for five years, worked as the bookkeeper at Schacht-Tuck Co. five years and the Farm Bureau nine years. She was later named Manpower Temporaries' Secretary of the Year and was with Colonial Caterers 40 years, supervising at hundreds of events, including the Kentucky Derby five years.

Her talents for homemaking were only surpassed by her leadership abilities. The Illinois Homemakers Extension Association elected Eunice to three terms as Vice President of Cultural Arts and Textiles, then to a term as State President in 1987-1988. She attended the International convention in Ireland, then reported on it to local chapters across the State of Illinois.

The Rockford Register-Star published an article recognizing her as a positive role model, and she was named a "Super Senior" in 2001. She was a lifelong active member of the Burritt Community Methodist Church in Wempletown.

She loved plants, animals, children and rural living. She was always helping others, cheerful, optimistic, witty and a solid source of moral support for everyone who knew her.

She is survived by her son, Edward J. (Sylvia) Pagel, sisters Dorothy (Howard) Hays of Rolla, MO and Louise Shepley of Tycson, AZ plys many nieces and nephews. Predeceased by husband Charles and sister, Fran.

### HUMAN TRAFFICKING SEMINAR REPORT

Approximately 33 individuals attend the seminar on Human

Trafficking presented by Sr. Patrice Colletti on Friday, November 10, 2006.

Charlene Edmiston with the Illinois Rescue & Restore Campaign was a guest who shared about the status of current projects in Illinois.



Sr. Patrice stated that human trafficking is now the #1 illegal activity in the world, ahead of the illegal sale of drugs and

weapons. Human trafficking involves over 12.3 million humans; 4 million are sold across international borders, 50% of which are children and up to 80,000 come to the USA. Eighty percent (80%) of all trafficked victims are females and children and 70% are sold into the commercial sex trade.

Why is there trafficking? Sr. Patrice listed four reason:
1. Vulnerability of the victims due to social and economics deprivation.
2. Greed—its BIG\$\$ - \$10 Billion annual.
3. Corruption - either no laws or weak ones, corrupt judges and law enforcement officials.
4. Invisibility - for every one victim that comes forward, there are 10 - 12 others not rescued.

Sr. Patrice concluded by sharing a model of response. It consists of four parts.

1. Awareness of the problem - which was the focus of this seminar. 2. Prevention of trafficking - address the root causes as listed above. 3. Protection of victims - many of the projects of the Rescue & Restore initiative are working on this issue. 4. Restoration of victims - the long range needs of victims.

Our seminar was only the beginning for becoming aware of the Human Rights problem. We must learn to look beneath the surface in our society to find victims, learn what can be done to help prevent human trafficking and learn how to protect and restore its victim.
