

Thank you to everyone who voted at the IAHCE State Conference and your well wishes. I have been a part of HCE (Home Bureau) all my life, and earned a Bachelor of Science

Degree in Home Economics Education from Murray State University. My mother was a 50 year Charter Member of HCE in Massac County. I attended most of the HCE meetings with my mother and my sister as I was growing up. I was a member of 4-H for 11 years, a Club Congress Home Management winner, and the first National winner from Massac County. I then became a 4-H leader after college and served as

a club leader for 30 years. I also volunteered as the 4-H Federation sponsor for 8 years.

After college graduation, I married my good friend from school, 4-H and church, Steve Korte. # INTERNATIONAL RITA STEWART





### SALES/CVH ALICE GROOMS

CONGRATULATIONS to all of the CVH winners and a Great Big Thanks to everyone that participated this

year. We had 51 counties with 1,196 members plus 2 units participating for 378,862 hours volunteered! Volunteer hours are now valued at \$20.25, so we all saved everyone \$7,671,955. Now that is a lot of money; where would we all be without volunteering.

Here are a few interesting statistics:

- 392 members received a seal or certificate.
- 58 members had over 1000 hours reported for one year.
- 516 members were new participants.
- 5 new county participants.

Each year we have a few people and counties drop off but then we have a few people and counties start again. Remember, you can go back three years to report your hours if you have dropped off.

Some comparison statistics:

# IAHCE EXTENSION LIAISON

It was great to see over 400 from all over the state in attendance at the IAHCE Annual Conference. As I bring greetings from University of Illinois Extension! I want to commend you as an organization for your CVH hours for the hours of volunteer work that you provide to your communities and counties. The value of your time is \$20.25/hour according to the Independent Sector. That is what your time is worth; unfortunately you can't cash in your hourly amount. On a state level, over 378,862 hours were turned in which is valued over \$7,672,000.00. Your leadership to your community, county, district and state board not only benefits IAHCE but many other organizations in your communities.

Change is ever present and that is true for U of I Extension. This staffing change is motivated by the shortfall from the State of Illinois financial problems. Also we have had flat funding from the Federal since early 1980's. It is my understanding in early April, county units will be asked to match up with other counties. The exception is Cook County. Interim Director of Extension and Outreach - Dr. Robert Hoeft's plan had 35 multi-county planning groups. Currently there are 77 units. Extension Centers will be closed. The local units will identify educational needs for educators. Since education is our mission, Dr. Hoeft's plan calls for more educators, who will be located in the local offices. Because of leadership development of IAHCE, you can help with the transition to the future of U of I Extension.

Remember all of the positive attributes HCE offers you and your community and county. When I was a child, my grandmother Rogers and my mother were very active. My mother is still active. Friends, community projects, trips, crafts, knowledge from money, family, horticulture, health and food, fellowship and community based projects – Linus Blanket and many others. Remember to ask a friend to a meeting and you may have a new member in your mitts.

I recently had an inquiry about who was Juliet Lita Bane who wrote the *Aim to Homemaker* – When she wrote the *Aim*, she was the Program Leader for the University of Illinois in 1918. She later became the Dean of the Department of Home Economics and her mentor was Isabel Bevier.

I wish you the best as we go through another growing pain – but you are strong.

### RICHLAND.....

In March of 2001, the Richland County Home Extension Association members decided to do a Community Outreach Project. With a lot of interest in quilting, several HEA members met and organized Blanket Brigade. Their objective was to make quilts and blankets for newborns in need, and to give extra comfort to children in time of sickness or trauma, admitted to the Richland Memorial Hospital in Olney, IL.

Nine years later Blanket Brigade is still going strong. Workshops are held at the extension meeting room almost every second Monday of the month. The blankets are made of donated, bright cotton print fabric, with non-allergenic batting. Polar Fleece is also an easy popular blanket that is warm and cuddly. Monetary donations are used to buy thread, binding, batting etc. Wonderful volunteers cut, sew, quilt, tie and sew on labels with our name. Other volunteers launder the blankets and quilts before they are delivered to the hospital. The blankets are given by the hospital to needy newborns and children who are experiencing the uncertainties of being hospitalized. Donated material not suitable for infants is sometimes made into lap robes for the Long Term Care Department at the hospital.

Since March 2001, many volunteers (members and non members) have shared their time and talents making quilts and blankets. At the March workshop we had eighteen volunteers working. As of March 2010, Blanket Brigade has made and donated 2050 blankets and quilts to the Richland Memorial Hospital. With a lot of flu, sickness, and surgery, blankets have been in great demand this past year. Forty blankets/quilts were donated in February. The blankets are well received by the patients, and the support of the community has been great. There is a blessing to those giving and a blessing for those receiving the blankets.

Another Blanket Brigade project is making water absorbing neck ties for the Richland County service men and women. These are made by cutting a strip of cotton fabric four inches wide and the width of the

fabric which is 45-60 inches long, fold and stitch the sides together, then turn inside out. Then a granular crystal, called polymer, is sewed in the center. When the tie gets wet the polymer expands and stays cool for 2-3 hours. The ties are sent in the Richland County Home-Front boxes to our overseas troops.

We have been blessed by the support of members, local citizens and churches with the Richland County HEA Outreach Projects.


