

Upon my return from conference, and when I had the opportunity to check my e-mail, I had an e-mail from a county that had just been notified by the IRS that they had lost their not-for-profit status. Reason being, they had not filed the 990 forms for three consecutive years.

I really feel like I have failed in some way to convey to all of the counties the importance of filing the 990. I hope that this alert will make you realize the importance of filing all paper work in a timely manner. What that county faces now to be reinstated as a not-for-profit organization is filing a form that is about 20 pages long and a fee of \$850! How many of the counties in the state can afford that fee or doing a form 20 pages long? The little e-file 990 that you do online is very easy, is only one page long and costs nothing!

Help me fellow treasurers; how can I get it across to the correct people that you must do this paper work? Call me immediately if you do not know what I am referring to or the people you tell do not know what you are talking about. You will be doing your county a big favor if you have them avoid what this other county is faced with now. I will even give you my cell phone

# U of I Extension Liaison Jenna Smith

I just returned from a wonderful trip to the 88<sup>th</sup> Annual IAHCE Conference in Effingham. I truly enjoyed meeting and visiting with

hundreds of HCE members from various counties across the state. As part of the "Garden of Volunteers" theme, I dressed up as the Chiquita Banana Lady and paraded around with a basket of fruit on top of my head. What fun is it if we can't make ourselves look a little foolish? The parade was just one of the things that made the conference a huge success, and I congratulate all those who worked so hard to make it "one of the best conferences yet!" I may have said it before, but I'm so amazed when I hear about the many wonderful things that you do. This past year, 1,817 members reported 490,024 volunteer hours. (By the way, this is over 1500 more hours than what was reported last year and more people turned in their hours this year as compared to last). According to the Independent Sector, the Estimated Dollar Value of Volunteer Time is \$21.36 per hour. That means that your time of volunteer work for the past year is worth \$10,466,912.64! WOW!

To let you know a little bit about what's going on in Extension... Beginning April 1st, we will have a new Family and Consumer Science Program Leader. If you remember, Dr. Judee Richardson has served as interim in this role and did a fine job of leading our program areas.

However, she will go back to her previous position as Extension Specialist in Family Life/Family Resiliency. Dr. Jennifer McCaffrey will now serve as FCS Program Leader. Dr. McCaffrey, has provided leadership for the Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) for more than 10 years in the Chicago area. She is a registered dietitian and has her PhD in public health from the University of Illinois-Chicago. In other news, we also have 6 Family and Consumer Science position openings: 1 Family Life Educator, 3 Nutrition and Wellness Educators and 2 EFNEP Educators. So we are hoping to get these positions filled soon!

Together, you are a "Garden of Volunteers." With more than 9,000 members, your "garden" is as big as 3 quarters of the length of a football field! Continue to volunteer and continue to recruit to make your garden grow even bigger.

You continue to make Linus Blankets (462 reported), 120 quilts and comforters for veterans, 173 quilts for kids, 159 pillowcases for veterans and children's hospitals, 634 little dress for African girls and 108 shorts for boys. About 1200 Christmas stockings to our soldiers plus 235 boxes for Christmas, 680 dozen cookies, too.

50,000 coupons were sent to Germany for use by the families of troops and some coupons valued at \$147,912. I don't know how many coupons that is but sounds like a lot. There were 150 activity bags for children, 100 blankets for hospitals, 632 cough pillows, 150 caps and mittens for children, 76 boxes of Kleenex to local schools, 5 boxes of assorted school supplies. 261 bags for wheelchairs and walkers, 10 prayer shawls, 75 catheter bags, 160 pillows for shelters, 20 pinafores and shirts for historical society.

You have given many other items to schools, soldiers and your communities that I do not have a number on. You have done a wonderful job in helping others.

The buyers were each given a plastic glove and a box to fill with whichever kind and quantity of cookies they desired. Cookies were sold at \$8.00 per pound. Members also donated toward the purchase of boxes and the cost of printing fliers to advertise the sale. The unsold cookies were given to PADS and a church that was hosting seventy-five sailors on Christmas Day.

The Lake County Fairgrounds was the site of the bake sale held my LCAHCE on March 10, 2012 during the fairground's hosting of antiques sale. Bake sale items were packaged in individual portions which could be purchased and eaten immediately. Even though the sale was scheduled to take place only on Saturday during the antique sale, many of the antique vendors who arrived on Friday evening to set up their booths asked to purchase our baked items that evening as our members were setting up their booth. This helps to bring the fundraising total to just over \$1,000.00.

As of February, 2012, \$1,114,074.00 in coupons has been sent to military families at the U. S. Air Force base in Spangdahlem, Germany since the beginning of the coupon program started by the Volo Unit of LCAHCE in July, 2009. Another \$361,407.00 in coupons has been sent to the U. S. Army base in Brussels, Belgium since July, 2010.

An organization in Missouri has lists of military bases that can use the coupons, which must be manufacturer's coupons, and also handles the reporting. The Volo Unit chose the name of "Volo Clippers" to use for reporting purposes. These members collect coupons, which come from both HCE members as well as the general public, then clip, sort, count and ship the coupons. The coupons are sorted into food and non-food categories. The total value of the coupons is reported each time a box is sent.

Postage is \$12.95 per box. The Volo Unit pays for one box to be sent each month. Anyone interested in starting a coupon program in her county/unit can contact Volo Unit member, Betty Wertke, at bwertke@oawl.net for more detailed information.

The annual International Day event hosted by the LCAHCE was held on March 1, 2012 at the U of I Extension Auditorium in Grayslake, IL. 


