Most of these items are things that people need, but cannot be bought with food stamps. You spend so little time, but do so much good when you collect these items. You might also be helping to save the life of someone you know or love by helping with a blood drive. Don't forget, if you have another project that you'd like to work on, go ahead. These are all great opportunities to let the public know who we are and what we do.

The Family Issues topic for 2013 is "Health Smart", with a focus on exercise for your heart. We have become a society that would like to be healthier, but lack the motivation to make strides to improve our health. We hear so much in the news about young people who are overweight in epidemic proportions. As mothers, grandmothers and aunts, we should strive to set an example for young people and others we encounter daily to help them improve their

overall health and fitness. The American Heart Association website provides several resources for proper nutrition and fitness. Our guest speaker at this year's state conference was Beth Walker from the American Heart Association. She works in the Southern region and has many good ways for us to improve our health. I have included in the packet a 7-week training schedule to prepare for a 1 mile or 5K run/walk. This is a great way to keep your body in good shape and to use up some of those unwanted calories! services that we offer and promote HCE all the time. We need those new members to help our organization grow. Don't keep all the fun to yourself, share it.



this time to share with you part of my speech at this year's annual business meeting:

Within my short 3 years with Extension and my 2 years serving as your Extension Liaison, you have seen Extension go through a multitude of changes. We are now in 27 units and not just individual counties, we are divided into 3 regions instead of 5, we may be in new offices, have new program areas, new job descriptions, and new staff. On the outside surface, we may look very different. But our commitment and our mission have not changed. That mission is:

"to enable people to improve their lives and communities through learning partnerships that put knowledge to work."

Now this mission sounds very similar to the mission of IAHCE. Your mission reads:

Let me say that again....if *you were to get paid* for all that you do, you would earn collectively, \$12, 514,781.44. I think that deserves a round of applause!






