
From the Desk of the President



I look forward to seeing you at the Secretary training during District Workshops in August 2014. Feel free to drop me an email or call me at 618-554-1790 any time with your questions.



The much anticipated announcement of the new country of study was made March 19 during the international Share Shop at the IAHCE Annual Conference.

Germany is the new country of study. Share Shop attendees watched a travel video from the German National Tourist Board, enjoyed a video of music and pictures from various places through-out Germany, and saw high lights of the PowerPoint lesson on German prepared from IAHCE members.

An extensive lesson package was provided for each county and an Associated Country Women of the World update, including the Triennial Resolutions and Recommendations. During the Share Shop suggestions for improving Special International Events were made with emphasis on using imagination. Two of the IAHCE members attending the Share Shop were born in Germany and one-fifth of the attendees were *Deutschamerikaners*.

It's the 80th Anniversary of IAHCE's membership in the Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW). Beverly Earnhart, ACWW Area President, could not attend the conference; but, she sent a greeting. A copy of her greeting is in each county International Director's lesson package. ACWW has an updated website, including some information that may surprise you. The United Nations declared year 2014 as the International Year of Family Farming (IYFF). The Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations is facilitating its implementation. 



December found the extension board enjoying a Christmas luncheon complete with our "hats"—Santa hats however—thanks to our board chairman, Pat Morthland. This was quite enjoyable and a big change from our normal business meetings.

January began our annual geranium sales and February gave us the lesson for living on Parenting." Many positives were quoted about the internet lessons from the University. In March we're having the "Preparing for a Nursing Home Visit" lesson.


